Depression

is the #1 cause of disability









Risk Factors for Major Depression

| Risk Factor | Association |
|----------------|--|
| Gender | 2 times more likely in women |
| Age | Peak age of onset is 20 to 40 years |
| Family history | 1.5 to 3.0 higher risk |
| Marital status | Higher in separated, widowed, divorced |

Other Risk Factors for Major Depression

Chronic stress

Severe traumatic events in childhood

• Life transitions (grief, job loss, relationship break-up)

Chronic pain

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"Depression Paradox" Racial Differences in Depression Prevalence

National Epidemiologic Survey on Alcohol and Related Conditions (n = 32,752)

African Americans Non-Hispanic Whites

Lifetime **8.9 14.6**


12-Month **4.5 5.5**



African Americans and Mexican Americans have the lowest rates of depression treatment in the United States





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More People in U.S. Initially Seek Mental Health Care from Clergy than Psychiatrists

| Activities | Goals |

| Icebreaker | Deepen relationships and provide chance for everyone to share |
| Elect Community & Academic Co-Chairs | Promote 2-Way Power Sharing within the group |
| Create & Sign Partnership Agreement (i.e., MOU) | Formalize partners' commitment |
| Identify Mission & Values | Create clarity around the work |

Community Coalition Impact

| Outcomes | Impact |
|--|--|
| Hosted a mental health symposium for "contact" anti-stigma efforts | Over 400 NYC residents attended symposium |
| Expanded focus of NIMH-funded K23 Award | Trained over 300 people in Mental Health First Aid |
| Supported the work of First Corinthian Baptist Church | Church created a free-standing mental health clinical called the HOPE Center |






